time, with a bit of planning those with little time, or younger children, can be in and out in around two hours (the Arizona experience is 75mins).

Tickets to the Navy-operated ferry ride over to the Arizona memorial are free. However, they're in hot demand, so urge clients to get there really early or book on-line the day before, to avoid about a three-hour plus wait time for the ferry over.

There's plenty to see and do at the Pearl Harbor Historic Site exhibits, which are free—but the trip over to the Arizona memorial (which sits above where the ship sunk and visitors can see the oil bubbling to the surface) adds another dimension to the experience, especially for children.

#### ... Tickets

Tickets to the Arizona are available on-line. If they are sold out for the dates clients want to visit, more tickets are released 24-hours before. In addition another 1300 tickets are available daily, but allocated on a first-come, first-serve basis. To book tickets, **CLICK HERE** 

#### ... No Bags

An important tip for those heading over to the Arizona is that no bags are permitted on the ferry ride over to the memorial—and it is enforced. There is a bag storage area for USD3 per bag.

## **Walking Back In Time**

For parents looking to add a little cultural insight into Waikiki, there are free guided historical walking tours offered Mon-Sat 0900-1100. There's two tours, the Kalia Tour, which leaves from the second floor of the Kalia Tower at the Hilton Hawaiian Village; and the Queen's Tour which leaves from the info kiosk at the cnr of Kapahulu and Kalakaua Aves. ### **Have Faith**

Surfing and Waikiki go hand in hand—and an increasing number of holidaying 'groms' are trying their hand at surfing on the gentle Waikiki waves. Faith Surf School (on the beach in front of the Outrigger Waikiki) can be recommended for those with younger, or nervous, beginners. Faith recommends its semi-private and private lessons for those aged 12 and under, priced from USD100 for 90 minutes. A new and fun addition to the day cruise market is the Honolulu-based Hawaii Pirate Ship Adventures. Boasting its own misfit pirate crew, the company offers a fun filled 90-min sailings on its Spanish galleon along the Waikiki shoreline. While passengers can do as little or as much as they like, our junior reporters didn't sit down once during the cruise as they raced from firing water cannons, to spotting treasure (and dolphins), engaged in a little swashbuckling (as pictured) and pirate games.
