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Best For Snorkelling And Diving



Hawaii Tourism Oceania has put together its top spots for visitors keen to experience the underwater delights Hawaii has to offer.

The historic Kealakekua Bay on Hawaii Island is shielded by cliffs, with waters calm and rich in marine life; and the southwest side of the island is shielded by Maunaloa, making the waters there calm and clear. Bays include Honaunau Bay (Two-steps), so-named because there's a spot on the shoreline where the volcanic rock has been worn away into a convenient two-step entry point for snorkellers and divers.

Oahu's most popular snorkelling spot is Hanauma Bay, on the southeast-



ern tip, which is accessible and family-friendly (although the park is closed on Tues).

Just off the south coast of Maui is the small island of Molokini, which has colourful reefs and was named a State Marine Life and Bird Conservation District. Molokini is only accessible by boat tour from nearby Maalaea Harbor, Kihei and Lahaina.

Hulopoe Bay on Lanai's southern coast was once named America's best beach and offers excellent snorkelling near its tidal pools, or visitors can hike a bit further east to find Lanai's iconic Puu Pehe, or Sweetheart Rock.

At the end of the road on North Kauai, there's Kee Beach, which features a protected lagoon perfect for snorkelling in the summer (but winter brings rough and dangerous conditions)—and offshore reefs provide a great setting for advanced scuba divers.



Hawaii Yoga Festival Comes To Puna

Both yoga fanatics and newbies can practise their best pose along Hawaii Island's Yoga Coast, a stretch of conservation coastline in the district of Puna, at the Hawaii Yoga Festival 09-16 Nov. The annual festival aims to make 'empowered learning, spiritual transformation, and immersion in nature and Hawaiian culture' accessible to everyone. Visitors will have the chance to engage in asana practice, dance, kirtan, meditation, wellness treatments, Hawaiian ceremonies at sacred locations, talks from Hawaiian spiritual kahunas, and more.
