# **Better Hawaii Airports**

Funding has been increased for agricultural inspection stations in Hawaii, which allow passengers to directly connect to flights to the mainland from neighbour island airports. The Senate Appropriations Committee passed the agriculture appropriations bill for fiscal year 2016, with some USD27.9 million put towards airport agricultural inspections at airports on Kauai, Maui, Oahu, and Hawai'i Island. "Without agricultural inspection stations at our neighbor island airports, tourists would be forced to claim the bags in Honolulu, get them inspected, and then recheck them before boarding their flights home," says US Senator Brian Schatz. "This funding makes it easier to ensure visitors and residents alike have a better experience traveling through our airports."
