### Agents Reject Extinction Claims

Kiwi retail chains have rejected claims that travel agents are in danger of extinction in the next five years.

Greg Pankhurst of Balance Recruitment said agents, along with accountants and those in IT, manufacturing and retail, are under threat from online shopping and outsourcing.

"Someone like a Flight Centre agent or anyone in the retail sector, they're coming under pressure for different reasons," he told *Radio Live*. "Good travel agents, good retailers, these roles aren't going to totally disappear but you can see huge chunks of the industry going away."

### . . . Not So, Say Chains

Kiwi retail travel chains are disputing Pankhurst's claims, saying





the value of a travel agent can't be matched by the internet.

"There's a place for the internet but it can't provide the added value that agents can. We believe the internet's probably at the highest penetration level that it's ever going to get," says Flight Centre's David Coombes. "At the end of the day we wouldn't continue to invest in bricks and mortar if we didn't think there was a future in it."

Harvey World Travel general manager Adrian Turner agrees—and points out that Pankhurst is in recruitment, not travel.

"The consumer will always require a certain degree of face-to-face consultancy. There are many New Zealanders that love the experience of walking into a store and talking through the various options, and they can't get that interaction from internet-based technology," he says. Meanwhile, House of Travel's commercial director Brent Thomas says while there is a degree of 'adapt or die', the success of the Kiwi travel industry of late shows retail agents aren't in danger as long as they continue to adjust to the changing market.

"There's still value for a customer to go to a travel agent, and there's still going to be value for a business customer to use a TMC to ensure they get the best for their dollar," he says.

Perth is the most expensive city in Australia for a night out because of its high accommodation prices, shows TripAdvisor's latest TripIndex. The company looked at the cost of a hotel room, dinner, drinks and taxis in the country's 10 largest cities, and found a couple would need to spend around AUD431. Brisbane was next on AUD409, followed by Canberra (AUD390), Sydney (AUD389), Melbourne (AUD379), Sunshine Coast (AUS374), Gold Coast (AUD370), Adelaide (AUD356), Newcastle (AUD355) and Wollongong (AUD340).

### **HLZ Int'l Services End**

Virgin Australia has confirmed it will suspend its services between Hamilton and Sydney effective 27 Oct. The move will mean the end of international services for HLZ airport. The carrier has cited lack of demand on the route as the reason for axing the Tasman flights.

### **DJ Reviews UM Policy**

Virgin Australia says it is reviewing its policy on who can sit next to unaccompanied minors after a male passenger complained about his treatment on a flight recently. The male fire fighter was shifted from his seat next to two unaccompanied boys, and says the crew handled the shift badly—asking a nearby woman 'can you sit in his seat because he is not allowed to sit next to minors'. Similar incidents on other carriers have generated heated debate over whether the airline policies are discriminatory against men. DJ says the policy was first implemented due to customer feedback, and it will be reviewed. QF and NZ are among the other carriers which also have the same UM.

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### TCF Receives Kiwi Kumuka Claims

Australia's Travel Compensation Fund says it has had 'quite a few' claims and enquiries from Kiwis in the wake of the Kumuka collapse.

"We have had a number of claims from New Zealand, it's been quite substantial, and we've had a few enquiries as well," says TCF chief executive Glen Wells.

The TCF is expecting more than AUD2 million in Kumuka claims, and to date has received AUD1.7m. AUD600,000 has already been paid out.

Wells did not have exact figures but said 'quite a few' of those claims had come from Kiwis.

### **OF Returns To OOL**

Qantas will resume Sydney-Gold Coast flights to meet domestic demand for premium leisure and business services. The thrice-daily flights operated by 737-800s will commence late-Oct and the OOL passenger lounge currently used by Jetstar will be refurbished and reopened as a Qantas Club by years end.

### **EK Tasman Sale**

Emirates has economy and business class fares to Australia on sale to 20 Aug. One-way fares start at \$198 to Sydney, \$201 to Brisbane and \$198 to Melbourne. Business class fares to SYD are from \$620 ex AKL or \$616 ex CHC; \$624 to BNE; and \$607 to MEL. Travel dates vary.

### **NZ Wholesale Fares**

Air New Zealand has released wholesale fares to Samoa, Rarotonga and Bali on sale until 20 Aug, and has extended sales of its wholesale Tonga and Fiji fares to 20 Aug. Travel dates vary, wholesalers have details.

### **QF UK/Europe Change**

Qantas has added points to Red e-Deal, Super Saver and Flexi Saver economy fares for seasonal travel ex New Zealand to the UK/Europe. Rotterdam has been added to Zone A, and Agadir, Casablanca, Marrakech and Stavanger have been added to Zone B.

### **Free Night With Huka**

Huka Retreats is offering a free night with stays of three nights at its properties in Fiji, South Africa and New Zealand. The free night will take the form of a gift certificate, is valid for 18 months, does not have to be used immediately and can be transferred to someone else (but must be used at the same property).

This is the first time Wells is aware of when Kiwis have claimed through the TCF.

They were protected because Kumuka was based in Australia and the TCF has a protection mechanism meaning clients did not have to be an Australian resident to claim.

"We're very happy to be in a position to be able to help our Kiwi neighbours," Wells says.

### **'Tourers' Vital To QLD**

New research has highlighted the importance of tourers to Queensland's tourism economy. Tourers, defined as visitors who stay at least four nights and make three stopovers during their trip, contribute AUD2 billion to the QLD economy and the state's Minister for Tourism Martin Ferguson says the report's findings will allow tourism businesses to provide focused services for them particularly in the growing self-drive market. The number of international tourers visiting QLD from 2000 to 2010 has increased 2%, and they mainly come from New Zealand, Europe and the UK.

### More On JQ Tie-up

Qantas has made two submissions to the ACCC on its cooperation agreement with Jetstar—outlining the services that currently overlap between it and JQ Asia, and emphasising that it does not control JQ Asia.

QF has clarified that service overlaps currently only include Jakarta-Singapore, Bali-Singapore and Perth-Singapore. QF has also provided details on which QF/JQ flights overlap with other carriers included in the proposal, including Vietnam Airlines, Japan Airlines and China Eastern Airlines with details of which other airlines fly those routes.

The law firm responsible for the submission has clarified that the QF group has a 49% minority share of JQ Asia, and QF is only able to appoint two of the five directors on the board of the holding company.

### **EK Back To Libya**

Emirates will restart flights to Tripoli from 29 Oct, saying the time is right to head back to Libya as it demonstrates 'strength and resilience in the face of adversity'. The flights will leave Dubai every Mon, Wed, Fri and Sat and provide direct connections with all flights from New Zealand.




